- ¼ teaspoon paprika

### Bits and Pieces of Berwyn and Branchville

Some of you out there have already seen this, but the old neighborhood has changed enough that I believe we should run it again. So here it is (with more to come in future issues of the Berwyn News):

Berwyn is a community that started as an adjunct to the Branchville community and specifically on the Higgins family plantation known as "RED HOUSE", the Bewley family plantation known as "LOCHAVALLE" and a small part of the Miller family plantation known as "CHEW'S FOLLY". The Millers and the Higgins families had made the unfortunate decision to support the wrong side in the second Civil War (the first being the Revolutionary War) and the Bewley family came in to help both families pay off their indebtedness to the losing side by buying a goodly portion of both plantations. The Bewleys knew what it was to be losers in a civil war. It was just not a civil war in this hemisphere.

Development started in our neck of the woods with the end of the second civil war. What better place to put new civil servants, now employed by the growing federal government, than on the old plantations lying on the side of the B & O railroad to Baltimore. By 1875, we had grown to be a good size community and a lot of families were buying lots and building homes. One of those families was the Werber family. From that family was born Bill Werber. Bill grew up in Berwyn and played professional baseball in the Majors. Bill is still alive and Jack Perry and I met him one Saturday morning when Bob and Katherine Conley were moving out of their home. It was the Conley house where Bill was born. But I have gone on too long. Let Bill continue the story with the Preface, Dedication, and Chapter One entitled Boyhood in Berwyn, Maryland from his book CIRCLING THE BASES.

Spring is an exciting time in Berwyn – our street (Osage St.) is a special treat when the white and pink dogwoods are in bloom. If you wonder how Berwyn stays so beautiful, it is thanks to the wonderful trees and gardens as well as the efforts of residents to pick up their own yards and curbs, pick-up after their pets, pick-up after their parties, and join neighbors twice per year with a trash bag in hand and make sure Berwyn is spic and span. The Berwyn Neighborhood Spring Clean-Up promises to be a lot of fun – join neighbors at the Trolley Trail plaza/kiosk on Berwyn Road on Saturday, April 22 at 9:00am to help pick up trash around Berwyn. Also, some interesting items are found each year.

**EARLY ACTION TO AVOID MOSQUITOS:** Spring is a good time to check your property and make sure you are not attracting mosquitoes, which can lay their eggs in even a tiny amount of water. Patrol your yard regularly and don't let water sit for more than a couple of days in pet dishes, birdbaths, or plant dishes. Recycling bins should be kept indoors - no matter how you turn those things, they trap water. Why did they put the holes at the high points on the bottom of the bin? My husband actually drilled 10 holes in the bottom of our recycling bin and it no longer traps water – if you have no indoor space for it, try that the drilling method. Also, watch for kid's and pet's toys, and old tires are the worst.

Below are two tips on ways to kill mosquitoes from Ellen Sandbeck, in her book, "Eat More Dirt: Diverting and Instructive Tips for Growing and Tending an Organic Garden":

**CAFFIENE** kills mosquito larva: put powdered coffee in puddles or ponds to kill larvae, and also vegetable oil on top of a pond can kill larvae when they come up to breathe.

**BAT HOUSES:** While we don't want bats in our attics, bats outside are a 100% natural way to reduce the mosquito population. You can promote bats living in Berwyn by putting a bat house on your property. While some bat houses cost as much as \$100, I found some inexpensive options on the Internet at [www.birds1stchoice.com](http://www.birds1stchoice.com) – options include a \$35 bat house or a \$20 bat house kit. Also, for those who are handy, there is a book on making bat houses available at [www.batcatalog.com](http://www.batcatalog.com) for only \$8.95. Let's go batty in Berwyn and help keep us from going buggy this summer!

**LANDSCAPING AND GARDENING IN BERWYN:** Do you have extra bulbs, hostas, lilies or other plants that need thinning? Some neighbors have expressed an interest in a garden exchange. If you have an interest in this and ideas on how it could work, please come to the next BDCA meeting or if you can't make it, contact me (see my contact info in top margin). We look forward to having an expert gardener as a speaker at an upcoming BDCA meeting.

**PAWN SHOP FOLLOW-UP:** Berwyn got a lot of press about the pawn shop issue – thank you to everyone who turned out at the meeting last month where we voted unanimously to oppose the special exception permit for a Pawn Shop to be located on Greenbelt Road on the edge of Berwyn. In addition to a front-page article, Debbie Mims and Kevin Young both had editorials published in the *Gazette* on the issue, and the *Diamondback* also picked up the story. Expect a formal resolution at the upcoming Civic Association meeting that we will submit to the planning board.

**PAINT BRANCH PARKWAY CROSSING:** We received an unfavorable response from Department of Transportation on our request to put a traffic signal where the Trolley Trail meets Paint Branch Parkway. See our letter and the County Response under "Advocacy Letters" at [www.myberwyn.org](http://www.myberwyn.org). BDCA Vice President, Chuck Ireton is taking up this issue, including a potential compromise idea to put a sidewalk on the north side of Paint Branch Parkway going to the traffic light by the Fire and Rescue building. This idea will be discussed at the April 20 meeting and stay tuned for next steps.

Many thanks to those of you who have sent in your BDCA dues this year – we are now up to 10% of Berwyn Residents as dues-paying members of the Civic Association. We are very proud of your involvement and activism to keep Berwyn a great place to live. And, thanks again to everyone who came out to the Pot Luck Dinner. I know our family really had a blast and we look forward to an even bigger gathering next year!

# City Council Musings

Illegal immigration, global warming concerns, electric deregulation rate increases, and trash. These are big items in our daily newspapers. However, in College Park, our concern has been narrowed down to "How can we spend city tax dollars?" The major concern that I have with the city's spending plan is that there are few, if any, attempts by the city council to cut spending. Every council member has a good idea on how to spend, but I do not sense any concern about cutting spending and putting efforts in to the overall mission of the city government. More efficiently, we will get a property and (for the businesses) a personal property tax increase. Yeah, I know that story, "It's only a penny and a portion." It is still an obligation that must be met by the taxpayer. I offered an idea that College Park increase the tax on concerts held in the city. You wouldn't believe the hassle I went through. The Diamondback newspaper has recently run a story about concerts held in the Comcast Center on the campus. State law permits local jurisdictions to tax the events to a maximum percent. Your council finally agreed to raise it from the existing 4+% to 7% - we are permitted to go to 10%. I know that once we implement the 7%, the council will be very reluctant to raise it to the maximum. Your council has a history of not going up on anything that was just raised. This excludes fines and penalties. However, your council will ask the businesses if we can raise our meter rates, and don't even think about taxing the tickets for a sporting event above what is today...that is the Holy Grail.

The mayor was insistent that the amount of money in the budget for contract police be increased. The council has blessed this, even though we didn't or won't spend all that was appropriated last year. I would urge you all to stop by Public Works and take a tour of the two 'temporary' modular buildings that we, College Park, provide for our public works employees. In my opinion, they are a disgrace to our city and its workforce. These are where employees report in the morning, change from street clothes, and wash up and go home from at the end of the day. Many eat their lunch here also. Foremen do not have decent space to meet with employees for evaluations and other one-on-one conversations that should be private. This foreman should have a space where he or she can keep his or her stuff; records, schedules, fact sheets, etc. Don't let me get started on the restroom facilities. I've been assured that 'it's coming'...of course, after another study.

Route 1 – City staff are working with Park and Planning on another study for Route 1. This is just

what we need – another study. Yes, I know that new facts and planning buzzwords have emerged...so we have to do another study to implement the new buzzwords.

There seems to be some misunderstanding about my views on 'M-square'. My problem is that I've been involved for so long that I forget that most of you have not. I support transit-oriented development and intense development around Metro stations – with an intention that the transit system, as opposed to automobiles, be used by employees to get to the area. There should also be mixed uses with housing and amenities so that the area doesn't become a ghost town at 5 pm or quitting time. Thank you for the phone calls on my musings, and I will try in the future to be more specific about why I vote the way I do.

Our neighborhood is a mess and since we cannot stop the visitors to our community from littering, a clean-up is scheduled. Join us on Saturday, later than I would like, and let's pick up Berwyn. Remember, if it don't grow here, it don't belong here. Pick it up and properly dispose of it. Wear gloves and bring a bag. We'll try and get some from the city.

I'm against having a pawn shop on Greenbelt Road...is that clear enough? We will have a resolution available, and offer for adoption that follows up on last month's vote to oppose, at the meeting. This will be forwarded with our letters to the powers that be all the way up the chain.

See you at the meeting, and on the clean up. May God continue to bless America.

Greetings neighbors. In the past few weeks the Mayor and City Council have worked to put together a City budget for FY2007, which begins in July. The proposed budget provides funding for a variety of expanded programs, notably contract policing and property code enforcement. Does this mean more City taxes? Yes. City property taxes would increase by almost 6 percent, which equates to about \$20 to \$25 for most owner occupied homes. The proposed tax rate increases from 28.5 cents to 29.9 cents per \$100 of assessed value, almost a 5 percent increase in the rate. With property assessments limited by the City to a 1 percent increase, the resulting tax impact is almost 6 percent.

The proposed budget calls for City operating expenditures of almost \$10.6 million, an increase of about \$0.7 million. The budget includes a wage increase of up to 5 percent, consisting of a 2.5 percent COLA and merit increases of 2.5 percent. Major increases are expected in energy costs, especially electricity (up 25%) and health care costs (up 10.4%). The police budget more than doubles to almost \$0.6 million, though that number includes \$60,000 to study the City's police options in more detail. The proposed budget would allow for over 200 hours of policing a week. The proposed budget would also increase staffing of the code enforcement department to 10 people, as compared to 8.5 currently. More attention would be provided to the exterior appearance of properties.

With respect to Berwyn, the budget provides for \$20,000 to complete the landscaping of the southern end of the Trolley Trail through Berwyn to address the erosion problem on the eastern side of the hill. A raised asphalt crosswalk would also be installed at the crossing of the Trolley Trail at Quebec Street, to address safety concerns there. The budget provides for 4 public safety phones, including 3 on the Trolley Trail. Berwyn would get a phone at the Berwyn Road Plaza and one would be located at Pierce Avenue in Lakeland. No street repaving is proposed for Berwyn in FY07.

Some funded initiatives include a review of all residential properties to identify rental properties which are not licensed by the City; development of form based codes as an alternative to the current zoning codes, a review of City-owned guardrails to assess their condition. Design and engineering work would be done at Duval Field in preparation for a complete renovation (\$1.5 million) of the facility in 2008-09.

The public hearing on the budget will take place at 7 pm on Tuesday, May 9th. Budget adoption is planned for Tuesday, May 23rd.

I hope to see you at the Berwyn District Civic Assn.'s Thursday evening meeting at Fealy Hall. Please use the form in this newsletter to join or renew your membership in the BDCA. Our costs for printing, our post office box, and sponsoring neighborhood events are about \$3,000 a year. The BDCA's family memberships are a major source of the funds that are used to print this newsletter and sponsor events.

Have you ever heard of "war driving?" I learned something new the other day through the Neighborhood Watch list serve. It all started when several neighbors reported a suspicious vehicle driving slowly through Berwyn:

*"I've seen an off-orange color Mercedes sedan--about 10-15 years old cruising the neighborhood the past few days. The driver has been a white male about 40 years old with a trimmed beard. I think the passenger has been a white female, but I didn't get a good look at that person. The car has a temp tag taped to the rear window on the driver's side--I couldn't read it from a distance. The back seat of the car has a lot of stuff in it--looks like boxes and clothes."*

Two days later, we got this follow up:

*"More about the orange Mercedes: On Monday afternoon, one of the neighborhood residents had the opportunity to ask the people in the Mercedes if they needed help. A man was driving, and the woman in the passenger side was scrunched down using a computer on her lap. They said they were looking for a house to buy. They couldn't give a direct answer about what houses they had seen, nor could they say what streets any of these houses were on. When the resident offered to help with directions to the next addresses in their search, the woman said that wasn't necessary, because all the information was on the computer. The resident did not find the story to be believable."*

Then we got these e-mails, which seem to explain it all:

From Mark Shute: *"It sounds to me like these folks were trolling for unsecured wireless area networks. They MAY be identity thieves. Might want to suggest that people keep their WANs locked as well as their doors."*

From Jill Reese: *"Most likely what you have described is 'war driving.' That's computer geek slang for people who drive around with laptops with wireless connections looking for open wireless networks to hijack and send spam from. War driving is done slowly because it takes a bit before the computer network card recognizes a signal and displays it. I work for the University of Maryland, and we recently closed down all of our open wireless points on campus (within the last month). You have to have an authenticated campus account to use the University wireless network now."*

*There are other more serious implications. If you don't have a decent firewall and you have wireless, your computer can be hacked and hijacked. Many home computers aren't up-to-date on security patches. And many home users make purchases and have low security on some auto-fill options for web pages, so it's possible to get credit card information and other sensitive information."*
